



Bug dial activity sheet

When you have downloaded the template for your bug dial, print the three sheets onto card.

Cut out the two disks with the pond creature information printed on them. Use a glue stick to attach them back to back so that the information is visible on both sides.

Cut out the two dials following the profile, including the notch in each.

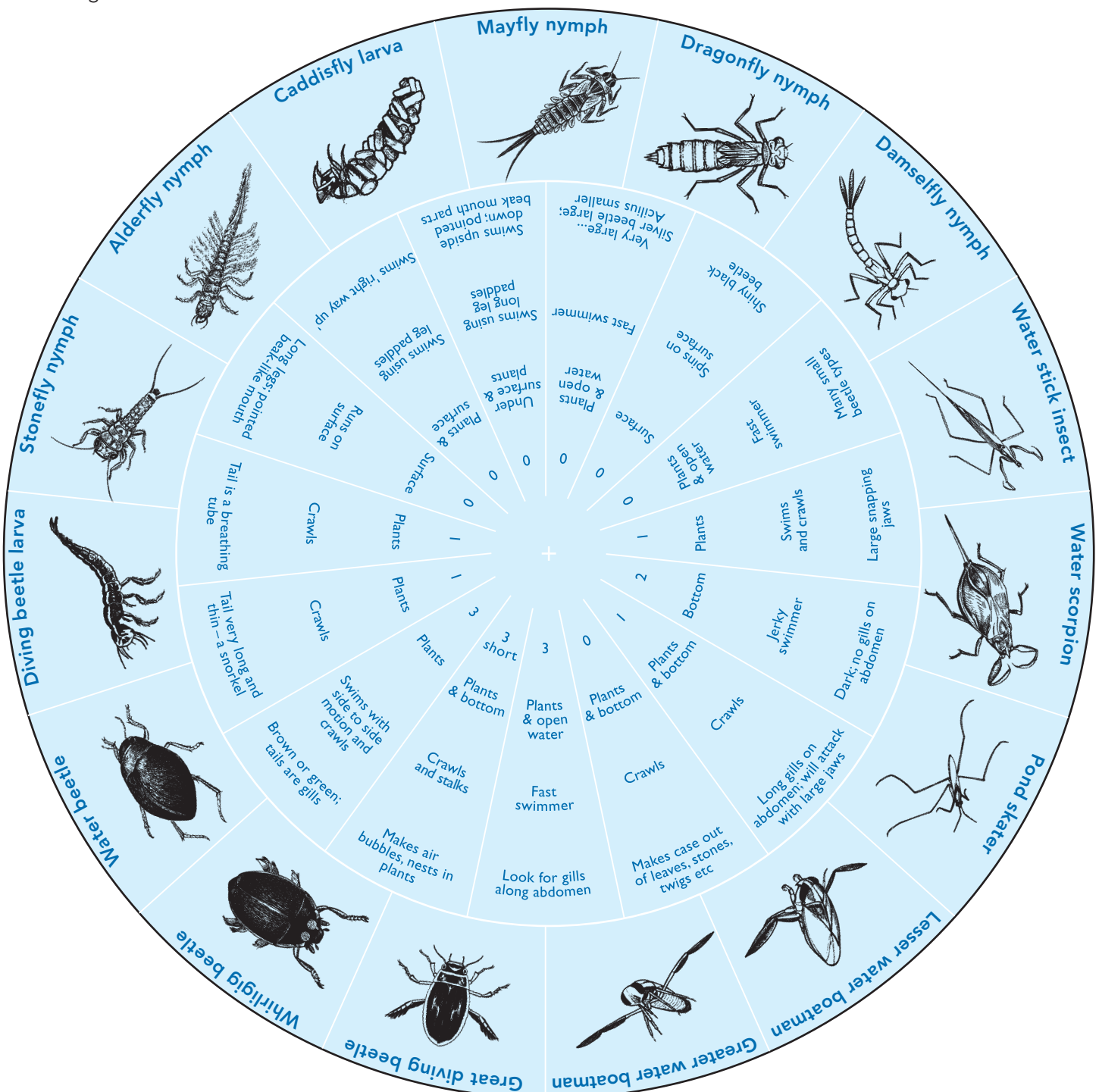
You should now have three pieces, the larger information double-sided disk and the two smaller dials.

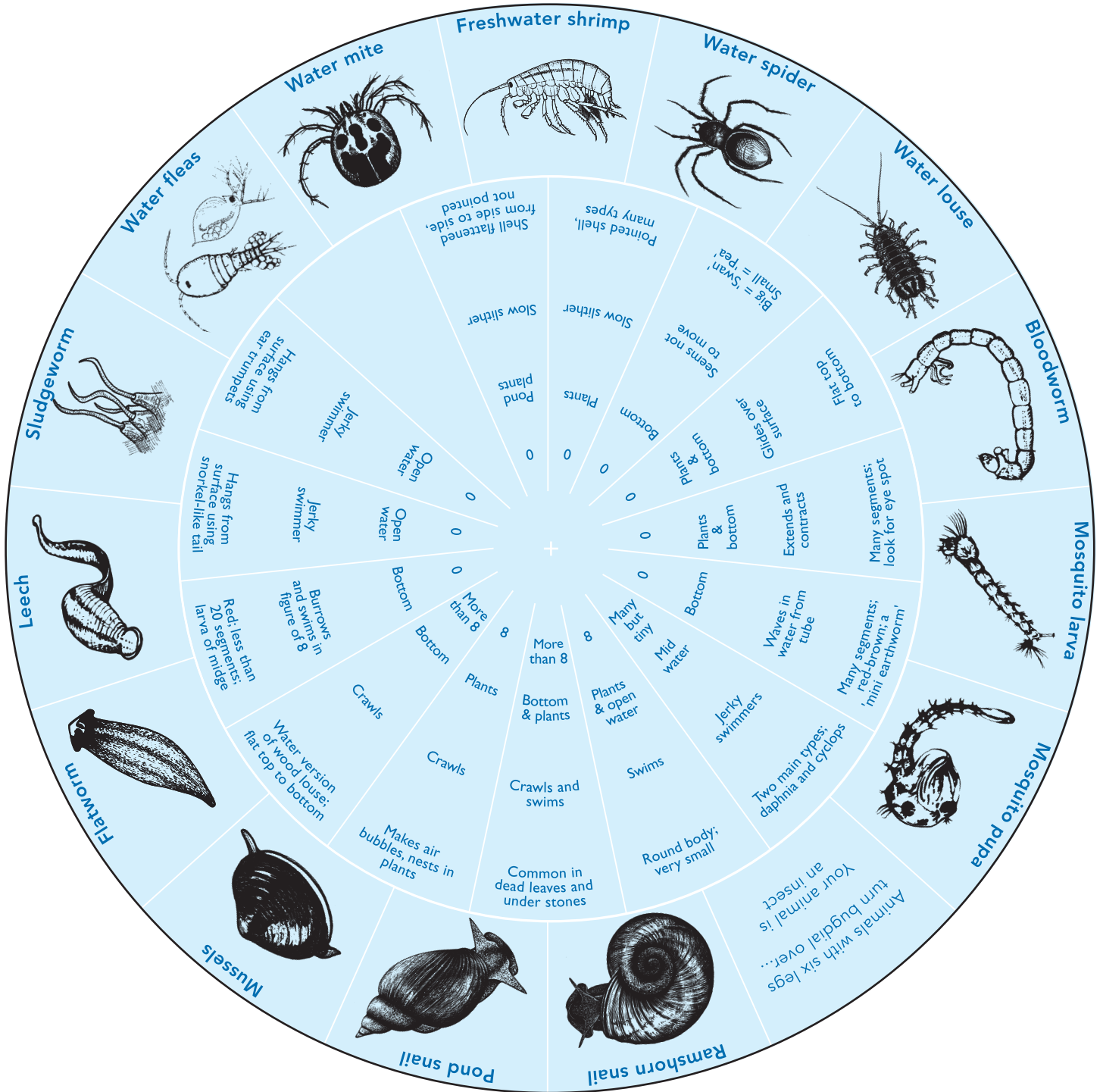
Pierce a small hole in the centre of each item and assemble them together using a split pin. You should now have a bug dial as shown in the picture with information visible on each side and you are ready to go hunting for some bugs.
